presídent's message

1916 — No Apology Required

Easter every year provides each of us with a unique opportunity to both meditate and celebrate. It reminds us that ultimately we are a Risen People.

In a wholly different context, Easter 2016 both commemorates and celebrates the 1916 Rising as a defining event for ALL Irish people, regardless of where they may now be scattered or when they or their ancestors left Ireland. Many of those wonderful folks were, in fact, driven from their homeland by oppression, and oppression clearly takes many forms. Lack of opportunity is a form of oppression. Lack of food and housing is a form of oppression. Denial of essential human rights is, indeed, oppression!

There are those here in America, in Ireland, and beyond who dismissively assert that there was never a need for an Easter Rising in 1916. They maintain that Home Rule had been guaranteed and that such an assurance would have ultimately translated into gradual independence for Ireland, despite the fact that Britain was openly arming and supporting those who would fight to the death to oppose that very pledge. These same pundits claim that resorting to violent rebellion was an unacceptably radical solution. Yet history is replete with examples of revolution providing the essential means for citizens to attain freedom, opportunity, and basic human dignity. Undeniably, our own American Revolution secured both freedom and nationhood, and it clearly took another armed struggle, the War of 1812, to re-affirm America's national sovereignty and independence from Britain.

And so it is tremendously frustrating to hear some academics undermine the legitimacy of the 1916 Easter Rising. But it is equally troubling to pick up vibes from various quarters that our world-wide commemoration should somehow be muted lest it offend anyone, especially those who explicitly or tacitly support British rule in the Six Counties. Let us be very clear as to our purpose. We seek to offend no one, and while we accept views in opposition to our own, we do see the 1916 Easter Rising as a major milestone on the road to our ultimate destination, which is a United Ireland where all of the nation's sons and daughters can live in respect, harmony and peace. Any attempt to de-emphasize, to water down, to neutralize or to neuter 1916 is essentially offensive to

As Hibernians in the United States, we look forward to all of the events planned to celebrate the brave women and men who in various ways sacrificed for Irish freedom in 1916 and beyond. I urge you to plan a suitable celebration locally. Be present, if possible, at the AOH-LAOH National Mass and Commemoration in New York City on Saturday, April 23, a project that has long been the effort of National Vice President Jim McKay and our 2016 Committee. Above all, let us all look upon this centennial as a serious opportunity for us as an organization and for us as individuals to both remember and recommit.

With the 1916 Uprising activities coming right after St. Patrick's Day and almost the whole month of April, it has compounded the problem. However, I hope that you take the time necessary to insure that your St. Patrick's Day traditions don't suffer because of what is to come the week after.

I would like to remind all our Brothers that on Saturday, April 23, the ladies and men of the Ancient Order of Hibernians will be commemorating the centenary anniversary of the Easter Rising in Ireland. This will begin at 1 p.m. with a Mass at St. Patrick's Cathedral on 5th Avenue in New York City.

The Mass will be concelebrated by many of the Chaplains of the New York area Divisions. The New York Hibernian Festival Singers will sing the liturgy that afternoon. Many Irish dignitaries along with New York's Consul General, Barbara Jones, will attend to commemorate this historic event.

Immediately following the Mass, all Hibernians and Mass attendees are invited to process down 51st Street to 345 Park Avenue where they will gather on the Plaza, which is directly in front of the office building of the Irish Consulate. All present will assemble on the Plaza for a reading of the Proclamation of the Irish Republic. Numerous pipe bands have already committed to join in the procession.

April 23, 2016, represents the eve of the anniversary date of the 1916 Rising in Dublin. All over the rest of the United States Division presidents have been asked to take some time out on that day for their own commemorations with some type of special event and for their own reading of the Proclamation.

Also to commemorate this very special year the National Boards of the ladies and men Hibernians have created a collectors album for this centenary year. The album will contain a history of the Road to Rebellion written by our own historian, Michael McCormack. It will also feature special messages from different Hibernian Divisions and members across America to help memorialize the event. On Sunday, April 24, in Pearl River, New York, the Rockland County Hibernians will be sponsoring a commemoration of their own with a dedication of their new GAA field, with a parade and with their own reading of the Proclamation.

All are invited to attend these functions in NYC and Rockland County that weekend. For those who wish to attend, Brother Jim Russell, County President, and Jim McDonnell, 1916 chairman in Rockland County, invite you all to Pearl River for the Rockland Commemoration. We have booked a block of rooms at the Pearl River Hilton at \$145 per night. The Pearl River Hilton can be reached at 845-735-9000; when booking your rooms, please mention the booking code: AOH 2. We will also be providing bus transportation into New York City for the 1 p.m. Mass Saturday at St. Patrick's Cathedral. There will be a \$20 round trip charge per person. There will be a function on Friday night (April 22, 2016) before at the John Cardinal D'Alton AOH Division 3 Hall in Pearl River; all are invited! Saturday will be spent in NYC and Sunday morning there will be a Mass at 10:30 a.m. followed by a parade at noon to the GAA Fields. Immediately following the ceremonies at the GAA Fields, The Rockland County AOH will be hosting a luncheon for all guests at the Pearl River Hilton. The cost of the luncheon will be \$40 per person. Memories of Atlantic City 60 Years Ago

The Biennial National Convention of the AOH/LAOH will be held in Atlantic City, New Jersey, from July 11 to July 14, 2016. The Brothers and Sisters from all over the United States are looking forward to four days of Masses, meetings, music and merriment.

Going to Atlantic City this year for me, a priest ordained 56 years, will bring back memories of the yearly late summer excursions of the "Four Amigos" between 1956 and 1959. That is the name I have given to myself and my three seminarian classmates who made the trip to Atlantic City every year at the conclusion of our summer assignments in our dioceses and before we returned to our theological studies at the Pontifical College Josephinum in Columbus, Ohio. The "Four Amigos" were made up of Bob from Port Clinton, Ohio, John from Philadelphia and Norb and myself, Tom, from Pittsburgh.

Bob would drive his mother's 1950 Buick from Ohio and pick up Norb and myself in Pittsburgh and drive down the Pennsylvania Turnpike to John's home in Philadelphia. We always stayed at John's home for a few days. John lived with his mother, Catherine, his aunt, Marie, and his siblings, Bill, Frank and Joan. John's father passed away at a young age leaving Catherine as a single mother to raise the four children with the help of her sister, Marie. John's family was so welcoming that the other three of us were treated like members of their family. When you attend a seminary for 12 years, your classmates become your brothers.

Financial secretaries, have you paid your 2015 national per capita? It was due to the national office by February 15th. Divisions who have not paid will not be considered in good standing and cannot participate in the national convention in Atlantic City in July.

Per capita is based on your membership as of December 31, 2015. It is the dues that you collected during the 2015 calendar year. Members exempt from paying per capita include priests, active military, and national life members. It is critical that our membership total numbers match your membership total numbers, especially Lines 11 & 16 on the Form 11. If our numbers and your numbers are off, we will need to take a closer look why that's the case.

When sending your per capita payment, please remember to include your completed Form 11 so that we can credit your account properly. We have payment from some divisions that were mailed without a Form 11. These have been set aside until we receive the Form 11. Also, we need your EIN number to file with the IRS.

County and state per capita checks are handled separately and should not be mailed to the national office.

Form 9s (certificate of election) are due to the national office as well. Addresses, phone numbers and e-mail addresses need to be included on the Form 9 for each officer.

A few reminders:

- The financial secretary assigns ID numbers, not the national office. For new members, always go to the bottom of your membership list and use the next open ID number.
- 2. Do not reuse past ID numbers for new members.
- 3. For reinstatements, if you have the member's old ID number, we want to use it, unless it's unavailable, then you'd assign a new number by going to the bottom of your list.
- 4. Send in Form 40s throughout the year with changes/additions. It will be less work for you and for us at the end of the year.

Monument to Irish influence on abolitionist

"Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass: An American Slave" was published in America in May 1845. The book of Douglass' life experience as an escaped and learned slave lent him credibility among the Northern abolitionist elite. It also drew the attention of his Maryland slaveholder who issued a bounty for Douglass' return. When this news traveled north Douglass knew he would need to flee America to maintain his independence. In August 1845 as An Gorta Mor took hold and hundreds of thousands were fleeing our ancestral homeland, Frederick Douglass set off for Ireland from Boston Harbor.

The Frederick Douglass Ireland Project was born some years ago when co-founders Kristin M. Leary in Washington, D.C., and Don Mullan, in Dublin, set out to promote the oft overlooked but integral connection Frederick Douglass had to Ireland. On his 1845 voyage to Ireland, Douglass saw first-hand the depth of despair wreaked on the island nation by British oppression. He had the opportunity to engage with allied progressives dedicated to ending slave labor. Most importantly, he met The Emancipator, Daniel O'Connell, and would forever be transformed by the experience.

O'Leary and Mullen worked with allied Irish-American organizations, the Frederick Douglass Family Initiatives, and Civil Rights activists to memorialize Douglass' contributions to humanity and the Irish influence on his work. In November 2015 the memorial depicted here was formally dedicated on the grounds of the University of Maryland. The cape he wears is modeled on O'Connell's and his outstretched hand fashioned from a study of President Obama's as Douglass makes an impassioned speech in Ireland.

Though they had but a short time together, Douglass recognized his moral alignment with the Irish. He remarked later in life on the effect O'Connell had on him and his future works. The Frederick Douglass Ireland Project will continue to host public events to promote civil and human rights. The Frederick Douglass Family Initiatives is run by Douglass' descendants and seeks to eliminate human trafficking around the globe.

The 2016 convention is upon us and thoughts are turning to State Delegates. The secretary's office is working hard to verify those divisions who are paid and unpaid. Remember, if your division per capita are not paid to the national your state will not receive the delegates for your division.

2015 dues collection is on a good track as we continue to improve our electronic communication and continued education of the procedures. As you have heard me say several times in the past, the per capita paid in 2016 is from the dues the division collected in 2015. Realistically there should be no delay in dues payment because each division should be restricting the National and State Per Capita from you dues until the payment is processed.

Dues and delegate counts are based on your division membership as of December 31, 2015. If your national list is not correct it will affect your dues owed. We have been working diligently for the last several years to get the local membership lists to match the National Board list. Division secretaries and presidents are the only people who can make the corrections. This year every division received a list that included a summary of your membership in order to make it even easier to update. Most divisions have done so but there are still a few who are behind the times.

It is the Division Secretary and President's responsibility to correct all spelling, address problems for any membership card by the end of the previous year. This allows you to receive the correct information on your current card.

Convention. Now is the time to reserve your room and register for the events at the convention. The rates for Atlantic City in July are incredible. Your room will only be \$126 and change, (including tax) which is very good. Some hospitality products will be provided to each hospitality room. The available product will be divided up between the rooms based on the size of the states involved and based on the number of convention registrants from each participating state on June 1. This makes early registration now critical for your state.

Taxes. On April 15, we will be filing a 1024 from with the IRS. This will list all boards included in our 501C8 Tax Exempt status. What we need to include your division, county and state boards is your form 11's (and 12's for county and state) including your EIN numbers. These are sent in with your 2015 national per capita. We are not permitted to include unpaid divisions on the list because they are not in good standing. All divisions who paid on time and included their EIN number will be part of our filing.

I have had the privilege to work with so many incredible Hibernians over the past several years. At the top of my list is AOH Brother Denny Donnelly. I had the honor recently of presenting Denny with his National Life Membership Award. I want to take time now to thank Denny for all the great work over the years at every level of our Order. I know his efforts will continue for years to come.

The last four years serving as your treasurer have been challenging, to say the least. I am looking forward to the convention and reporting on the challenges and how we addressed each. Although we have accomplished much in the last four years the challenges of taxes, dues collection and form updates will continue for years to come. It has been exciting to work on the transition of our national office. Jere Cole is doing a great job and I hope my efforts have assisted him. As I look back at the success of our National Office I know we would not be where we are today had it not been for the efforts of my Brother, my Friend, and my Mentor, Past National President, Past National Secretary, Tom McNabb.

Drogheda's Destruction by Oliver Cromwell

For this Digest edition's focus on atrocities enacted against the Irish People, I would like to concentrate on the tragedy of Drogheda inflicted by Oliver Cromwell and his Parliamentarians.

On October 23, 1641, (40 years after the great rebellion of Hugh O'Neill) the Irish in Ulster had once again risen in revolt against the English occupation of Ireland. From Ulster, that rebellion spread throughout the remaining provinces. Unfortunately for Ireland, the land remained bitterly divided among the various factions that made up the population at that time in Irish history.

By 1647 through 1649, the rebellion had suffered serious setbacks. On August 13, 1649 Oliver Cromwell set sail for Ireland with the sole purpose of bringing a final end to that rebellion by capturing those strongholds still in Irish hands.

Cromwell arrived in Dublin on August 15, 1649, and was greeted with the roar of cannons from the walls of the city and by a great and enthusiastic crowd. Cromwell's favorable reception was due to the fact that Dublin had become for all purposes an English city. All Irish Catholics had been previously expelled from the city.

Following Cromwell's arrival, plans were set in motion for laying siege to the city of Drogheda, which was under the control of Sir Arthur Aston, an English Catholic. With an infantry of 2,200 men and 20 cavalry, Aston had been left in charge by the Duke of Ormonde to delay Cromwell from marauding farther north.

Despite Cromwell's superior numbers (8,000 infantry and 4,000 cavalry), Aston was convinced that Drogheda's geographical location would enable him to survive the Cromwellian onslaught. So convinced was Aston that he stated, "He who could take Drogheda could take Hell." This confidence was based on the fact that the town was totally contained within a formidable wall — $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles long, 20 feet high, and 6 feet wide at the base, narrowing to 2 feet on top and situated near a steep ravine called the Dale.

On September 10, Cromwell demanded the surrender of Drogheda. With Aston's refusal, Cromwell's cannons opened fire. It did not take long before the city walls began to crumble. With the harbor blockaded by the Protestant Parliamentary fleet, the Duke of Ormonde was unable to send reinforcements. Knowing that Cromwell would show no mercy, Aston refused to surrender and continued to fight on.

The Catholic defenders fought bravely, at first turning back the attackers, but eventually the Parliamentarians crashed through the walls and seized St. Mary's Church. Aston and some defenders fled to Mill Mount. Possessed by bloodlust, the Parliamentarians rushed up the hill, and all defenders, including Aston, were killed by order of Cromwell. Cromwell's forces swept through the streets with orders to kill anyone in arms. Unfortunately, civilians also were killed in the onslaught. Priests and friars were treated as combatants by Cromwell's Puritans and executed. Even more horrible was the fate of the defenders of St. Peter's Church in the northern part of the town; the church was burned down around them.

By nightfall, only small pockets of resistance on the walls remained. When they managed to kill some Protestant Parliamentarians, Cromwell ordered the captured (Catholic) officers to be killed and every 10th Catholic soldier executed. Nearly 4,000 Catholics died at Drogheda.

When forces on one side of the river surrendered, Cromwell ordered the annihilation of that entire population. Cromwell later wrote, "I do not think that thirty of the whole number escaped with their lives." Irish survivors were sold as slaves to the sugar plantations at Barbados.

After the massacre at Drogheda, Cromwell sought to explain his actions in a letter to William Lenthall, speaker of the English Parliament. An excerpt from that letter follows:

"...I am persuaded that this is a righteous judgement of God upon these barbarous wretches, who have imbued their hands in so much innocent blood, and it will tend to prevent the effusion of blood for the future, which are satisfactory grounds to such actions, which otherwise cannot but work remourse and regret..."

Following the destruction of Drogheda, Cromwell turned his attention to the rest of Ireland and the subjugation and destruction of the "Papist" population.

Many today trace the current problems in Northern Ireland back to Cromwell. During the troubled years, British troops in Ulster were often referred to as "Cromwell's Boys." There is hardly a ruined building in Ireland whose destruction is not blamed on Cromwell and his forces.

For the Irish People, Oliver Cromwell is for all practical purposes "Ireland's Hitler."

In the days of Nativist Bigotry, our immigrant forebears stood guard around Catholic churches to safeguard our clergy from the anti-Catholic Know Nothings. As they were needed then, we are needed now! The number of applicants to the religious life is decreasing each year due largely to the cost of educating and sustaining novitiates. We are being called again to the old tradition. It is our turn to emulate those courageous Irish men and women who kept the faith alive for us, and keep it alive for our children and grandchildren. You can prove that the ancient spirit is still alive in you by supporting Project St. Patrick.

The goal of Project St. Patrick is to fund grants in perpetuity and increase support for these men and women of God. Project St. Patrick is a joint Catholic Action program of the Ancient Order of Hibernians and Ladies Ancient Order of Hibernians that was started in 1995.

Your ongoing and continued support is greatly appreciated. You will be again asked to fill out a Diocese information form. I know that many of you did this last year but we are asking for it again. The event was well attended and the division was happy at the end of the afternoon, to meet their FFAI donation goal. My special thanks and congratulations to the Officers and members of Division #32, Chicago, for hosting a terrific successful FFAI fund raiser and treating Agnes and I with such a caring and warm welcome. I look forward to seeing some of you guys in Atlantic City this summer.

The Republic of Ireland Elections

As we go to print there is still recounts taking place in 11 electoral districts in Ireland. Irish Prime Minister Enda Kenny has admitted his coalition government has failed to secure a return to office as the country's election count continues. Results so far suggest Mr. Kenny's Fine Gael party will remain the largest in parliament, but will have only a narrow lead over its main rival, Fianna Fáil. The Labour Party, the junior coalition partner, looks to have suffered badly. Sinn Féin, smaller parties and independents all appear to have done well. Just a handful of seats have yet to be declared. Notable candidates elected include Sinn Féin president Gerry Adams and Agriculture Minister Simon Coveney, of Fine Gael. Alan Kelly, the deputy leader of the Labour Party, narrowly retained his seat. However, Fine Gael's deputy leader, and Children and Youth Afairs Minister, James Reilly has lost his seat in Dublin Fingal. Fine Gael's former justice minister Alan Shatter also lost his seat, as had Alex White, the Labour Party's communications minister. After being elected, Gerry Adams criticized both Fine Gael and Fianna Fáil. "Elections give voters the opportunity to choose who should run their country, but the results in the Republic of Ireland suggest the public cannot agree on who should take power. The next Irish parliament will be a divided one, with a definite split between left and right". Enda Kenny has gone on record stating that there will not be a ruling government in place in time for the upcoming 1916 anniversary celebrations in Dublin. We shall wait and see what develops.

Remembering 1916 - 1966 Events

This year Irish men and women all over the world are preparing to celebrate the 100 year anniversary of the 1916 Easter Rising in Dublin. As the April 24th date approaches, I remember back to that date in 1966 when the nationalists in Ireland were gearing up for the 50th year anniversary celebrations. I had a full time position in the Belfast City Hall. On

weekend nights I worked in a bar in The International Hotel, an establishment in the center of Belfast, Catholic owned and reputed to hire only Catholics.

The hotel's reputation as a nationalist business was further enhanced when it was reported in the Belfast newspapers that members of Sinn Fein planned to have a 50th Rising anniversary dinner celebration in the International. (No other Belfast hotel would entertain them.) Belfast was a nervous town back in those days. loyalists believed that every catholic slept with a gun under their pillow and were waiting for April 24, to have a second Easter Rising. Ian Paisley was pestering the then Prime Minister of N.I., Terence O'Neill to invoke special security measures. Paisley and Ned Carson (son of Lord Edward Carson) formed the Ulster Protestant Volunteers. Their aim was to interfere with planned republican marches and be ready to put down any attempts of a second rising. Terence O'Neill was forced to react and so he mobilized 10,500 B Specials, sent in army helicopters to the Irish border, stopped and searched trains from Dublin to Belfast, armed RUC police with machine guns mounted at road check points, all to be ready for a rising. Easter passed with some nationalist riots. June 1966 rolled in and the loyalists were all fired up celebrating the anniversary of the World War One Battle of the Somme. We had another loyalist group formed the Ulster Volunteer Force (UVF). Again an Ian Paisley invocation along with a new character, Gusty Spence. They set out to topple the Terence O'Neill government. The UVF began their reign of terror by murdering an innocent catholic, Patrick Scullion a friend of mine. A gentle giant who was walking home after a night of drinking with friends. They shot him from a car as they were slowly cruising around our Catholic neighborhood looking for a soft target. Their second murder was a mistake. They threw a petrol bomb through the window of a protestant widow's home, killing her. The real target was a Catholic owned bar next to the widow's home. Days later the UVF sent a message to all the Belfast newspapers stating they had declared war on the IRA and any of its splinter groups. This is where the International Hotel comes into the picture. The bar staff of the International Hotel frequented a private club for a few drinks after leaving the hotel. I often joined the guys there for a few beers, but on that night, I had another date and did not accompany them. For some reason that night four of the bar staff ended up in the Malvern Arms, on the loyalist Shankill Road district. The UVF gang under Gusty Spence's leadership were also in the Malvern Arms bar that night. Upon questioning the strangers at the bar, Gusty was told by one of them that they worked in the International Hotel. As I mentioned before everyone knew that the employees of that hotel, were Catholics. Gusty informed his UVF cohorts that there were 4 IRA members at the bar. His gang left early, obtained some weapons and ambushed the four lads when they left the bar. The result was 1 dead, my friend Peter Ward, 2 wounded and 1 who was lucky to escape injury. There were a few RUC policemen in the bar that night. It did not take long before Gusty and his gang were arrested. During the trial one of the gang said to the police, "I am sorry I ever heard of that man Paisley and decided to follow him". They got heavy jail sentences. But that was not the end of their story. 1966 was the year that started the 'TROUBLES' as history now refers to that terrible period that ended with the Good Friday Agreement.

Let us hope that the 1916 Rising celebrations this year, north and south of Ireland, are incident free.

Christianity 'running on fumes'

Los Angeles Auxiliary Bishop Robert Barron said popular culture's message of individuals being "infinitely right" is "repugnant to (Catholics') Eucharistic faith. But he also said Christianity is "running on fumes" as it tries to counter the trend of people leaving the church or staying away from the Eucharist.

"What's sad today is so many in the Catholic world have become blasé about the Eucharist." The bishop said only 30 percent of Catholics in the United States actually receive Communion, calling this a "disaster."

Bishop Barron – author of numerous books and a longtime faculty member, then president of Mundelein Seminary, major seminary of the Archdiocese of Chicago – said the call of the church today is to retain Catholics and attract new ones.

"If the church can't find a way to tell that story (Catholic faithful "did not invent their own story, we belong to a story" and that is God's drama) in a theo-dramatic way, people will drift away to this easy self-invention philosophy," he said. "So it is a real challenge to the church. We've got to be bold. We've got to be confident. We've got to be smart."

People ignore Jesus' commands all the time, said Bishop Barron, but "over the centuries that one dominical command (Do this in memory of me) has been massively obeyed." That revelation of the pattern of Jesus' life in the breaking of the bread is the moment the faithful "get it" and are no longer walking the wrong way, he added.

"Wealth, pleasure, honor, power ... we sinners, we go lusting after them all the time, but they won't satisfy us. Look for eternal things, eternal bread."

When Jesus says his body and blood are given up for everyone, the bishop said, "If he's the word of God, what he says reaches into the very roots of something and changes it. [He is] Really, truly and substantially present.

On the anti-defamation front we definitely have good news and bad news. The good news is thanks to your efforts, we are making progress on the anti-defamation front. As of this writing we are not seeing the defaming T-shirts at Walmart that we saw last year. As previously reported, the Order did have a conference call with the Walmart executive committee and the call concluded that they were now sensitive to our concern and would consider it in their buying decisions. Looks as if they were listening, as while some of current St. Patrick's Day merchandise may not be to everyone's taste at least we appear to have broken the Irish=Drunk message. We did on Walmat.com see one shirt being sold (by a third party vendor, not Walmart itself) with the phrase "I am so Irish my Liver Hurts," we raised an objection and they pulled it. Give credit where credit is due; they are listening. We have even seen progress from perpetual offender Spencer's, while they still have the reprehensible "Irish Drinking Team Shirt" that is about it, no "Everyone likes a Drunk Slut" or the "Drunk O'Meters" with a maximum rating of "Irish." Progress for sure, but more to do.

Things though sadly are not as happy on the media front. On March 2, i.e. two days into Irish American Heritage Month, ABC TV debuted the "Real O'Neals," a "comedy" about your "typical Irish Catholic family." To ABC TV your typical Irish Catholic family includes a domineering, sanctimonious mother who speaks in "Catholic Mom speak" and places statues of the Blessed Virgin on the toilet as a reminder to close the lid, a boorish father who is a cop named Pat, of course, a slacker son who is an anorexic jock, a daughter who is skimming from Catholic Charities where she uses 'Catholic Guilt' as a shakedown device and finally the hero of the piece who is a naive gay son who "comes out" at a bingo game. Making cameo appearances are a venal parish priest, angry nuns and Jesus, who acts like a character from "Wayne's World." In short, we have every defaming and denigrating Irish and Catholic Hollywood stereotype you can think of. We have issued a press release and called on your support brothers to protest "this performance that that may reasonably be interpreted / as caricaturing or debasing the Irish people" and that by the time you read this the "Real O'Neals" will be in the past with Thomas Nast where it belongs.

Brothers, this is one example that shows that anti-Irish Catholic bigotry is still all too acceptable in 21st century America. Exceptionalism is rarely a good thing, and it is certainly not a badge of honor to be the only ethnicity that can be safely defamed with impunity. I get the comments of some that "political correctness" often goes too far, but what does it say if we are silent when our heritage is denigrated while other are actively protecting theirs? That the denigration is true? That we don't care? We often here of "Irish Pride," let's make it more than lip service on St. Patrick's Day. Let's be Irish Proud every day and speak up when our heritage and ancestry is defamed.

Mass celebrated on altar made of snow

Father Patrick Behm's reference to himself as "a simple priest" went viral on social media for celebrating Mass January 23rd on the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

Father Behm, of LeMars, Iowa, was returning with others from the Diocese of Sioux City following the annual March For Life rally in Washington, when Winter Storm Jonas consumed the East Coast. The bus — and many other vehicles — had to stop on the turnpike because of an accident on the road.

A knock on the door of the bus changed it all for Father Behm and about 500 others. A man from Minnesota said that some people had constructed an altar out of the snow and would he (Fr. Behm) want to celebrate Mass. Fr. Behm, who had his travel Mass kit with him, was given the honor of being principal celebrant among the eight or so priests in the immediate vicinity of the bus. They also agreed that Father Behm should do the preaching. While not having read the day's Gospel from Matthew, Father Shaun Haggerty of the Diocese of Sioux Falls had, and said it would be easy to preach because the Gospel was about how everyone thought Jesus was crazy and they probably thought we were, too.

Distributing communion to several hundred individuals was next on the to-do list for Father Behm and reminiscent of another Gospel story. "I guess it was kind of like the loaves and fishes because we did have to break up the hosts into small pieces," he said. "I would guess about five pieces were not consumed. Father admitted that his hands were too numb from the cold to distribute Communion, and the other priests took on the task.

Father Behm recounted that the response to the 35-minute service, which started at noon, was gratifying. He also stressed the reason behind that Mass was initially the reason for the trip – the March for Life to overturn the 1973 Supreme Court Roe v. Wade decision, which legalized abortion.

"Make no mistake about it, the tide is changing and I believe this is the generation that will see Roe overturned," he said. "Every time I go to the March for Life, the crowd gets younger and younger. Christ was with us in this storm. He's with us in every storm, and it is He who will ultimately bring the victory."

The National Boards offer two \$500 Scholarships for this program. One of these scholarships is for the children and grandchildren of an AOH member and one of these scholarships is available for the children and grandchildren of an LAOH member.

I also appreciate your advocacy for my wife Siobhan during her Presidency of the Coalition of Irish Immigration Centers and her continued dynamic role as Executive Director of the Emerald Isle Immigration Center on the frontline, aiding the countless Irish immigrants and all that benefit from the work of the centers. It has been an extreme honor to come to know and work with you these past few years.

Currently there is an effort underway spearheaded by AOH JFK Division 5 and the IAUC to officially rename the park bordering Massachusetts Ave and 24th Street NW in Washington, DC in honor of Irish Patriot Robert Emmet. The park's chief feature is in fact an impressive statue of Robert Emmett that was erected 50 years ago on April 22, 1966, to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the Rising, it is only fitting that we as Hibernians now finish the job for the 100th. The park is currently named "US Reservation number 302" by the U.S. National Park Service, a banal identifier no one will miss. Robert Emmet was the quintessential Irish patriot; he was the inspiration for Clarke, Pearse and Connolly. It is only fitting that he should be honored here in America given that the inspiration for he and the United Irishmen was our own American Revolution, and his brother, Thomas Addis, a founder of the United Irishmen, immigrated to this country and began a second life as a distinguished Irish American.

Renaming "Reservation number 302" to "Robert Emmet Park" should be a political "no brainer," but the Brothers need your help to get this on the floor and cut through the bureaucratic red tape that Washington is famous for. We also draw your attention to the very worth efforts of the Brothers of Division 3, Doylestown, Pennsylvania, to properly honor Patrick Gallagher by having a U.S. Naval Guided Missile Destroyer named after him. Lance Corporal Gallagher was a recent immigrant from County Mayo when he was called up after being in this country only a few months, he could have very easily have returned to Ireland as his heartsick sister encouraged him to do. Instead, he answered his adopted country's call and served in Viet Nam. On July 18, 1966, while set in defensive positions near Cam Lo, Republic of Vietnam, the enemy attacked and threw a grenade into the position Gallagher and his fellow Marines were manning. Without hesitation, Patrick threw his body on the grenade in order to protect his comrades. The grenade failed to explode and Gallager, despite being under fire, continued to lie on the grenade until his comrades were clear at which point he picked it up and threw it out of the position, upon which the grenade exploded. For his heroism, Lcpl Gallagher was awarded the Navy Cross (he was actually recommended for the Medal of Honor, but one of his commanders felt he did not qualify because he wasn't killed; an injustice that should be rectified). Lcpl Gallagher would later be killed while on patrol only days from returning home. Please help the Brothers of Division 3, Doylestown honor the memory of this brave young Irishman who gave all for America by signing their petition. Historical Happenings

This is it. This is the time we have been waiting for – the Centennial of the Easter Rising in which so many put their lives on the line for the freedom of their homeland. It was the Bunker Hill of Irish history in that it was the first battle in the War of Independence and it is right that we remember it. And, it is uniquely Irish to have three commemoration ceremonies for this milestone, since three has so great a meaning for the Irish from the shamrock to the Trinity. So great, in fact, that Saint Patrick never had to use the shamrock to explain the Trinity to the people – that is a later myth.

Pipers' Parade

The first of the three commemorations will take place on the traditional Easter weekend (March 26, 27 and 28) when there will be great memorials in Ireland. One of which is scheduled to be a Pipers' Parade starting at Arbour Hill, the grave of 14 of the executed leaders, and concluding at the Four Courts. Congratulations to those Pipe Bands from America who have accepted the invitation to be a part of that historic event. I will be traveling with the Siol na hEireann Pipe Band of AOH Div 8, Suffolk County, NY, and will be there to see and report on the activities; I have also been given the great honor of saying a few words at Arbour Hill at the start of the tribute. Of course, I will mention the support that came from Irish-America.

Mass at St. Patrick's, Procession and Proclamation

The second commemoration will take place concurrently all over the United States as AOH men and LAOH women host Masses, parades, lectures and displays to remember that milestone in Irish history during the actual historic week of the Rising (April 23 to 29). The central commemoration that will initiate the nation-wide remembrance will take place in New York City on April 23 with a Mass at Saint Patrick's Cathedral, followed by a procession to the New York office of the Consul General of Ireland, Barbara Jones, for a remembrance ceremony.

Memorial unveiling

The third and final commemoration will take place on May 3, the day that the executions began. That event will be the unveiling of a huge, 12-foot-high memorial block of Wicklow granite, embossed with a carving of the GPO, the Proclamation and the names of the executed leaders with an Easter lily at the base. It will stand at the Cohalan Court Complex in Islip, Suffolk County, NY. Sponsored by the Suffolk AOH, the Brehon Society, the Police and Fire Emeralds and others under the guidance of AOH President Chris Thompson and his lovely wife, Melinda. Its significance is multiplied by the fact that the first day of the executions took the life of the impresario of independence, Thomas J. Clarke, who was a Suffolk County resident before returning to Ireland to organize the revolution. It is also significant since the Court Complex carries the Cohalan name – named for a family member of Judge Daniel Cohalan who was a leader of the Clan na Gael organization in America who helped to fund the Easter Rising.

Commemorate the heroism

How will you remember the heroes of Easter Week? If nothing is planned in your area, why not at least have a Mass said for the memory of the patriots.

There are also many books, calendars and articles that have recently appeared on the Rising and I am grateful for all the favorable comments on my Road to Rebellion book. They have inspired me to continue and I am currently working on the sequel, which will be called The Road to a Republic. This will be a tribute to all who suffered through the turbulent times that followed the Rising in order to fulfill the dreams of the Rising leaders. And they were demanding times indeed. Until I started researching last year, I really didn't realize the full intensity of the turbulence that the people went through in pursuit of that dream. Following the Easter Executions, there were six months of Martial Law under vengeful troops, a general internment sweep that incarcerated thousands more than were ever involved, the brutality of prisons and the Frongoch internment camp which became a university of rebellion. Then came the War of Independence against the brutality of the Black and Tans and Auxiliaries, a terrible Civil War, the era of the fascist Blueshirts, the struggle to remain neutral in another world war and the ultimate



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achievement of freedom for a major part of Ireland. In researching this entire time frame, I came to realize how much praise is due, not only to the belligerents who fought for their dream, but to the Irish people themselves, who supported the revolutionary Dail Eireann (Assembly of Ireland) in spite of British attempts to knuckle them under. Our forebears were a courageous lot, indeed and we, as their descendants, have much to be proud of.

Robert Emmet Park Needs You

The Washington, D.C., AOH are part of an effort to have the U.S. Congress officially name the small triangular shaped park bordering Massachusetts Ave and 24th Street NW as the Robert Emmet Park in honor of the heroic Irish Patriot whose statue stands there. Doing so would complete the process begun 50 years ago, April 22, 1966, to commemorate the Easter Rising in Dublin when the impressive statue of Robert Emmet (1778-1803) was installed on the prominent pedestal on this site. The Park is presently designated US reservation number 302 by the US National Park Service. Representative Joe Crowley will sponsor and introduce the necessary legislation.

Veterans affairsby JJ Kelly Chairman

Have you ever wondered where some of our old military related expressions originated? I'm not going to fall on my sword over these, but found them in a recent military source and found them interesting.

When it came to getting out of personal debt, there was an old saying in rural parts of America that if you could afford to hold on to your property, you would never starve – hence, "Don't sell the farm." Related to this, government subsidized life insurance for soldiers in 1917 was \$10,000 – about the same amount as the average farm mortgage. So, when a soldier was killed, the death benefit to his family literally "bought the farm." Again, I'm just reporting!

In the January-February The National Hibernian Digest, I commented on the new Veterans Choice Program. In summary, it is a new temporary benefit that allows eligible veterans to receive health care in their communities rather than waiting for a VA appointment or traveling to a distant VA facility. Since then I have heard from a couple of brothers who have pointed out that while there are some positive aspects of the program, there are still some bumps in the road. That may be expected when we have a couple of different agencies trying to learn a new program. The fact that Congress has cut some of the requested funding for the program has not helped. I have talked with some folks in the VA, related to them the issues reported to me by AOH brothers, and they have promised to look into these problems and try to make them better. If you have tried to use the Choice program, and have had problems or success, either way, please let me know so I can use this forum to pass along information to you, and to pass what gets reported to some senior folks in VA.

Just a couple of words on some recently passed legislation of interest to us as veterans. The 114th Congress has stated its intentions to make it a priority to help our nation's veterans.

Recently passed legislation includes:

The Hire More Veterans Act helps both veterans and small businesses by exempting veterans from being counted as part of the Affordable Care Act "employment mandate" rule:

The Border Jobs for Veterans Act is also a jobs bill for veterans. It directs the Department of Homeland Security to consider expedited hiring of qualified candidates for positions in Customs and Border Protection;

The Clay Hunt Suicide Prevention for American Veterans Act is designed to improve and increase access to mental health care at VA. It has been reported that veterans are committing suicide at the rate of almost 22 per day. We have to do a lot better here to help stop this epidemic.



We would like it if our ancestors were always on the right side of every question, and there were always positive progress. Tá daoine sa lá atá inniu ann ar mhaith leo ár stair a cheilt is a ghlanadh de gach rud nach maith leo. There are people today who want to cover up and clean up everything they don't like in history. Ar léigh tú an leabhar 1984 riamh? Have you ever read 1984? Ná glacfar le Poll na Cuimhne! Let's not accept the Memory Hole!

I nDeisceart na Stát Aontaithe, tá bród acu as a sinsir a sheas ar son na Cónaidhme. In the Southern US, they are proud of their ancestors who stood for the Confederacy. An Chúis Chaillte a cheiliúrtar, deirtear. They celebrate the Lost Cause, it's said. Bhí agus tá i bhfad níos mó i gceist ná an sclábhaíocht. A lot more was involved than slavery. Níor bhain an ciníochas leis an Deisceart amháin. Racism wasn't just a southern thing. Bhí mar a bhí. It was like it was. Ní bhíonn aon duine ná aon aois foirfe, agus tá sé glan mícheart ceartchreidmheachas polaitiúla a bhrú ar gach éinne, go háirithe ar an am a chuaigh thart, dar liom. Nobody and no age is perfect, and it's totally wrong to force political correctness on everyone, especially on the past, I believe.

Cheapfaí an Eaglais Chaitliceach a bheith ar son saoirse do na sclábhaithe, agus mar sin, an chuid is mó de shliocht na hÉireann. People would thint the Catholic Church favored freedom for the slaves Ach ní raibh sé chomh simplí sin! But it wasn't that simple! Mar a tharla, ba mhinic go raibh móramh na nDaonuasclóirí ina bhfrith-Chaitlicigh chomh maith. As it happened, often the majority of the abolitionists were also anti-Catholics. Is iomaí duine cáiliúil – laochra sa lá atá inniu ann – a bhíodh frith-Chaitliceach freisin – na Beechers agus Frederick Douglas ina measc! Lots of famous people – heroes today – were also anti-Catholic – including... Ní nach ionadh go mbíodh tuairimí éagsúla i measc Gael-Mheiriceánaigh na haoise sin. It's no wonder that there were various opinions amongst the Irish Americans of that age. Sa tuaisceart, ba maith leo bheith ina Meiriceánaigh agus gan trioblóid a tharraing orthu féin agus ar an tír – agus rinne siad mar a rinne an tír. In the North, they wanted to be Americans and not attract trouble for themselves or the country – and did as the country did. Ghlac siad leis an sclábhaíocht le ar son na tíre. They accepted slavery for the sake of the country.

Bhí file sa Deisceart darb ainm Abram Joseph Ryan - an tAthair Abram Joseph Ryan. There was a poet in the South named...Father... Ba as Chloichín an Mhargaid i gContae Thiobraid Árann a thuismitheoirí. His parents were from Clogheen in County Tipperary. Bhí a athair ina mhaor ar phlandáil i Maryland (agus sclábhaithe ann). His father was a plantation overseer (with slaves). Sheas an tAthair Ryan go dian leis an Deisceart. Fr. Ryan was strongly in favor of the South. Bhí sé ina shéiplíneach dá n-arm i rith an chogaidh. He was a chaplain t their army during the war. Agus ba Fhile na Cúise Caillte é. And he was the Poet of the Lost Cause. Bhí sé an-cháiliúil lena linn. He was very famous in his time. Mhol sé an Deisceart ina chuid dánta, agus a laochra. He praised the South in his poems, and their heroes. Agus ba chúis leis. With reason. Glacaim leis sin (mar a ghlactaí leis na cianta), cé gur throid mo shinsir féin ar son an Aontais. I accept that (as was done for ages), even though my ancestors fought for the Union. Bíodh dea-chuimhne acu ar a gcuid laochra. Let them have good memories of their heroes.

Ach mar scéal suimiúil eile faoi Chaitliceach Éireannach agus an sclábhaíocht, bhí baint nach beag ag Dónaill Ó Conaill le feachtas idirnáisiúnta na ndaonuasclóirí. But as another interesting story about an Irish Catholic and slavery, Daniel O'Connell had no small connection to the international abolitionist movement. Bhíodh cúrsaí an-chasta idir lucht tacaíochta Meiriceánacha Repéil in Éirinn, agus lucht frithsclábhaíochta na hÉireann. Things used to be very complicated between American supporters of Repeal in Ireland, and the anti-slavery people of Ireland. Tá leabhar an-suimiúil ar an ábhar seo, American Slavery, Irish Freedom: Abolition, Immigrant Citizenship, and the Transatlantic Movement for Irish Repeal, le Angela F. Murphy (Léirmheas anseo https://www.h-net.org/reviews/showrev.php?id=31925). There's a very interesting book on this subject (link is a review)...

Bhí ról lárnach ag Ó Conaill sa Chomhdháil Dhomhanda FhrithSclábhaíochta i Londain in 1840. O'Connall had a central role in the International Anti-Slavery Conference in London... Bhí Hibernian Anti-Slavery Society in Éirinn, agus ghlac sé páirt leo ag iarraidh Gael-Mheiriceánaigh a spreagadh in aghaidh na sclábhaíochta. There was...in Ireland, and he took part with them trying to turn Irish Americans against slavery. Níor éirigh go maith leo, agus chuir sin isteach ar an tacaíocht a fuair siad ó Mheiriceá i bhfabhar Repéil in Éirinn. They didn't succeed very well, and that damaged the support they got from America for Repeal.

Nach suimiúil an stuif seo? Isn't this stuff interesting? Ba bhreá liom níos mó a fhoghlaim. I'd love to learn more. Táthar ag súil gur mhaith linn go léir níos mó a fhoghlaim i gcónaí, agus nár mhaith linn cosc a chur ar chuimhne na staire mar a bhí - casta. Hopefully we'd all always like to learn more, and would not like to prevent remembering history as it was – complicated.

Division 8, Lawrence: Division 8 kicked off Irish Heritage Month on March 1 with the raising of the tricolor on the North Common. The tricolor will fly over the city until March 31. A Pictorial Exhibit of the 1916 Easter Rising was on display for the entire month of March at Lawrence's Heritage State Park. A lecture series and Irish Film Festival took place as well. Pennsylvania petition

To the Digest editor:

AOH Div 3, Doylestown, PA, is sponsoring an on-line petition addressed to Secretary of the Navy, Ray Mabus, requesting the naming of a guided missile destroyer after a Mayoborn USMC Vietnam war hero, L. Cpl. Patrick Gallagher.

In the early morning of July 18, 1966, while set in defensive positions near Cam Lo, Republic of Vietnam, the enemy threw a grenade into the position, which Patrick and his fellow Marines were manning. Without hesitation, Patrick threw his body on the grenade in order to protect his comrades. The grenade failed to explode until he picked it up and threw it out of the position, after which the grenade exploded. For his heroism, Patrick was awarded the Navy Cross. But on March 30, 1967, just two weeks before he was due to complete his tours and return home, Patrick was killed in action when his unit was ambushed by Viet Cong guerillas while on patrol at Dai Lac, near the coastal city of Da Nang.

We are requesting as many Hibernian brothers as possible to bring this project to fruition. Our goal is to honor not only Patrick, but also the hundreds of thousands of Irishborn U.S. veterans who served their adopted country so valiantly in wars from the Revolution until the present. We encourage participation by AOH members, their families and friends, and promotion through social media. We launched the petition on March 1 and ask you to sign on to help AOH Div 3, Doylestown, PA properly honor Patrick Gallagher by having a U.S. Naval Guided Missile Destroyer named for him. We believe that Patrick's life and death is symbolic of the Irish immigrant and stands as a testament to the character of Irish-American immigrants who've served our country from Revolutionary War to the present



South Carolina

The Brian Boru, Berkeley County Division, and Maewyn Succat, Dorchester County Division, co-hosted the ninth Bi-Annual State Convention. The AOH convention had over 90 members in attendance. The LAOH had previously voted to hold separate conventions and only in towns in which they had a Division, but many of the LAOH also attended with their spouses.

National Vice President Judge James McKay and National Director Greg Sean Canning were our special guests. We were honored to again have Bishop Robert Guglielmone celebrate the Convention Mass and speak at the Banquet. Six other Priests, including State Chaplain Msgr. Ronald Cellini, took part in the Mass and banquet. The Bishop announced that he was very pleased with the work and donations that the South Carolina AOH had done for Project St Patrick. He stated that the South Carolina AOH would be again allowed to collect for Project St Patrick at all churches and named March "Project St Patrick" Month in South Carolina. South Carolina is a missionary state with less than half of the Priests belonging to the Diocese. Project St Patrick is designed to assist all religious individuals in South Carolina. In addition to providing checks to each Seminarian at least twice a year and on Ordination Day, it has been expanded to assist the men in the Deaconate program. With a large need for Deacons to assist the Priests in South Carolina, a new program to assist them has been started. Two scholarships a year and a program to purchase books each semester for men studying in the five-year Deaconate program was started. The South Carolina AOH is also hosting a breakfast for the first Deaconate class to graduate in seven years and its members and their spouses on Ordination day. Over \$25,000 was collected in 2015 to fund these programs, and other needs of seminarians and religious members.

This past year saw the first annual South Carolina Road Bowling Tournament, hosted by the Bishop Emmett Walsh Division in York County. It was followed by a Chili cook-off with free chili for all attending the tournament. Our annual "Trip to Ireland" raffle increased in size and provided \$9,000 back to the Divisions and a large amount to support the state and its operations and charities. All Divisions participated and had their \$5 dues waived. Special fund raising events were held by several Divisions: the Harp and Shamrock Division in Greenville raised over \$18,000 for a religious home, the Bishop Patrick Lynch Division in Bluffton raised \$8,000 for the churches and schools, and the Joseph McGarry Division in Myrtle Beach held a golf tournament that raised over \$12,000 for charity.

At the Convention Banquet, the outgoing officers were recognized for their contributions to the South Carolina AOH the past four years. They had done an outstanding job and outgoing State President James P Nettles Jr was inducted into the South Carolina "Order of the Shillelagh."

The Hibernian of the Year was awarded to Richard "Smitty" Smith for his work in the Bishop Patrick Lynch, Beaufort County Division and as SC Project St. Patrick chairman. Richard was recognized for his work in expanding the Project St Patrick program and working with Bishop Robert Guglielmone, outgoing Vocations Director Fr. Jeff Kirby, incoming Vocations Director Fr. Mark Good, Deaconate Director Andre Guillet and the entire State Board.

South Carolina's own Carraig Phadraig Major Degree team hosted the Major Degree following the Shamrock Degree put on by the Bishop Patrick Lynch Division from Beaufort County. On both Friday and Saturday nights an outstanding hospitality room was hosted by members of the Brian Boru and Maewyn Succat Divisions. At the last State Convention, the National Treasurer saw the addition of the Fifth District in South. This time, Judge James McKay took part in passing along a voting ruling that was made at the request of the State Vice President. South Carolina only has one District with two Divisions. Legal Chairman Patrick Sturdy, informed us that we were in violation of the National Constitution, where each Division in a one Division County SHALL act as a County Board with 16 votes. Everyone at the convention was allowed to vote. A resolution was passed to send to National that the wording be changed from SHALL to MAY. With a number of small Divisions, over 1 out of every 3 members would be eligible to vote. We encourage each state to check your voting method and join us in the resolution.

Outgoing officers were President James P Nettles Jr, Vice President Jim Kelly, Secretary Mason Luther and Treasurer Dave Carlson. The newly installed state officers are President Larry Papineau, Vice President Jim Lawracy, Secretary Bruce Thompson and Treasurer Richard Smith.

South Carolina will hold the Southern Conference Regional meeting later in the spring after all National Convention information is available. A meeting was held in Columbia this past spring. This year's meeting will be to discuss plans for the Region and our participation at the National Convention. The region includes the states of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Florida.


St. Louis AOH Emerald Ball




Ordained in 1954, Father Kelly attended Catholic University in Paris from 1958 to 1961 and subsequently obtained his doctorate of theology from there in 1963.



Profiles in Patriotism

Tomás Ceannt (24/Aug/1865 - 9 May 1916)

Tomás Ceannt (Thomas Kent) was born in Bawnard House, Castlelyons, Co. Cork, in 1865 to a Republican family. When Thomas was 19 he emigrated to Boston where he worked as a church furniture maker until he returned to Cork due to ill health.

He became a member of the Irish Republican Brotherhood and Sinn Fein. The Kent family was supportive of the 1916 Easter Dublin Rising and would have traveled to Dublin had they been aware of events unfolding in the capital. When news of a planned Rising in Dublin reached the Kent brothers, they waited in neighboring houses for orders to mobilize. As members of the local IRB, they knew they would be suspect and didn't



reside at home for a few days. When Eoin MacNeill sent J.J. O'Connell to Cork with the order to stand down, the Rising went forward in Dublin and by April 30 it was over. Learning that the Rising was over, the brothers, Thomas, William, Richard and David returned home only to be awakened in the early hours of 2 May to the sound of gunfire.

The RIC had been sent to arrest all known sympathizers throughout the country, including members of the IRB and the Volunteers. They were to be brought to the local barracks for interrogation. The police came to the Kent house with orders to arrest the whole family, surrounded the house and called for the four brothers to come out. The 84-year-old mother, Mrs. Kent, called out: We are soldiers of the Irish Republic and there is no surrender. A gunfight ensued which lasted for four hours, in which an RIC Head Constable William Rowe, was killed, David Kent was seriously wounded, and the Kent's ammunition ran out. The police finally took the Kents into custody. Richard attempted an escape on foot to the woods but was cut down in a hail of bullets and died two days later at Fermoy military barracks.

William and Thomas Kent were taken to Victoria Barracks and both were sent for court martial on 4 May for the murder of the RIC officer. William was acquitted, but Thomas was sentenced to death and executed by firing squad in Cork on 9 May 1916. David Kent was brought to Dublin where he was charged with the same offence, found guilty and sentenced to death, but the sentence was commuted and he was sentenced to five years penal servitude.

Thomas Kent was buried on the Barracks grounds (now Collins Barracks) and the Kent family tried without success to learn from British archives where he was buried. The British finally released the information and on September 18, 2015, the remains of Thomas Kent were properly and honorably interred in St. Nicholas Cemetery after lying in state in Collins Barracks for two days.

William 'Willie' Pearse (15/Nov/1881 - 4/May/1916)

William 'Willie' Pearse was born at 27 Great Brunswick Street (now Pearse Street), Dublin, in 1881, five days after the second birthday of his brother Pádraic. The two brothers developed a close friendship in which William was completely devoted to Pádraic. Willie had inherited his father's artistic abilities and chose to follow in his footsteps as a sculptor. He was educated at the Christian Brothers School and he studied at the Metropolitan School of Art in Dublin under Oliver Sheppard. He also studied art in Paris. While attending the Kensington School of Art he gained notice for several of his artworks. Some of his sculptures are to be found in Limerick Cathedral, the Cathedral of St. Eunan and St Columba, Letterkenny, and several Dublin churches. He was trained to take over his



father's stonemason business, but in 1908 he left his father's workshop to become a teacher at Pádraic's Saint Enda's School.

Like his brother, William was a founding member of the Irish Volunteers and member of the Irish Republican Brotherhood (IRB). When Pádraic became more and more involved in the IRB, Willie took over the day-to-day running of Saint Enda's. Willie never achieved a rank of significance in any of nationalist organization to which he belonged, yet he remained a close associate of his active brother. On Easter Monday 1916, Willie joined his brother in marching to the GPO and stood by his side as Pádraic read the Poblacht na hÉireann proclaiming the Irish Republic. The rank of Willie during the Easter Rising is disputed. According to some he was an officer. British General Sir John Maxwell described Willie as acting as an officer. However, when Willie pleaded guilty at his trial, he stated that he was only the personal attaché of his brother without direct command. In any case, he took part in the Rising and was always at his brother's side in the GPO.

After the surrender Willie spent Saturday night on the lawn across from the Rotunda Hospital with the Irish soldiers who had surrendered. He was marched to Richmond Barracks on Sunday morning with the rest of the men where he was tried by Court Martial. It has been said that since he was only a minor player in the struggle, it was his surname that condemned him. However, at his court martial he rather exaggerated his involvement and perhaps condemned himself. On 3 May, he was granted permission to visit his brother for the final time, but while he was on the way to Padraig's cell, he heard shots ring out from the Stonebreaker's Yard and his beloved brother was no more! William Pearse was later visited by his sister and mother. They spoke in his cell and he told them that he had not seen or spoken to his brother since the surrender. Willie was shot dead in the same spot as his brother at dawn the next day. His body was taken to Arbor Hill cemetery and thrown into the pit beside Padraig and covered in quick lime.

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The Hibernian Rifles in Ireland

Until recently, The Hibernian Rifles of the American Alliance have only received a few lines in accounts dealing with the 1916 Rising. However, as part of our organization, they deserve to be better known.

Most know our American AOH, formed in New York and Pennsylvania, was descended from earlier secret societies in Ireland that were part of a long legacy of seeking Irish independence as far back as 1641. By enlisting Irish immigrants, the new American Order took on an animosity toward Britain, which was the cause of many of their members' forced exile, especially during in the years of the Great Hunger. They also maintained a close alliance with the Fenian and Clan na Gael organizations with the AOH raising funds and political awareness to support Irish independence, while the Fenians and the Clan supported a militant approach. The AOH also created a military-style committee called the 'Hibernian Rifles' to drill, train and serve as a protective honor guard for AOH functions.

In the early 1850s, some Societies in Ireland adopted the AOH name and established links with the American Order. In Ireland, the AOH evolved into a non-violent political society and, though supporting Irish independence, had little in common with militant Irish republicanism. Problems of a political nature emerged in the 1890s and the organization separated into the American AOH and the AOH BOE (Board of Erin). As the BOE grew more toward constitutional nationalism, a number of more militant divisions in Ireland broke with them around 1907 and maintained their affiliation with the American Order as the American Alliance (AA).

Highly selected men

The break was clearly between constitutional nationalists and physical force republicans. John Joseph Scollan as National Director of the AA, moved from Derry to Dublin in 1912. At this time the AA had three Divisions in Dublin and a number in provincial towns. Scollan later wrote, "I decided to organize a company in each division to be known as the Hibernian Rifles which correspond to the American organization. I started a unit in each division and succeeded in getting about twenty men to join in each. These were all highly selected men. At this time the total number of members of the divisions were 80, 100 and 150, approximately so that a unit of 20 men was a good beginning." He stated that the Rifles were non-sectarian and did not bar anyone from joining. As Commandant of the Hibernian Rifles, Scollan directed and controlled the force.

A newspaper, 'The Hibernian', edited by Scollan, was published from June 1913

newspapers, membership grew.

until March/April 1916, and had a national circulation of about 2,500 copies. The DMP (Dublin Metropolitan Police) in 1919 unsuccessfully applied to the Attorney General to have the paper suppressed as seditious. John J. Walsh, a prominent member of the Irish Volunteers who had been barred from Cork, moved to Dublin and joined the Hibernian Rifles as Vice Commandant because of his experience. Sympathetic former British soldiers provided instruction in foot drill and other military training. Recruitment was largely from the AA divisions but, after the first advertisements began to appear in Connolly's 'The Irish Worker' and 'The Hibernian'

By late 1913 the Hibernian Rifles had established units in Armagh, Belfast, Castlebar, Cork, Dingle and Dundalk. During the 1913 Great Dublin Lockout, many of their members were workers in Connolly and Larkins's union so Scollan applied to the American AOH; he received enough money to augment the AA strikers pay with 12 to 15 shillings per week. In 1914, with American money, the Hibernian Rifles were able to buy arms. The Hibernian Rifles also manufactured canister grenades and British surveillance estimated that they had about 140 men and 25 rifles drilling at the Hibernian Hall at 28 N Frederick St. The Clan Na Gael Girl Scouts, formed in 1910 under the auspices of the Hibernian Rifles, also drilled at the Hall.

'Through God's Grace'

When the Irish Volunteers split in 1914 after John Redmond offered them to the British Army, the AOH BOE remained loyal to Redmond and the Hibernian Rifles sided with the orig-Irish inal Volunteers. In a lecture to the Sinn Fein Michael Dwyer Cumann in 1914,

entitled 'Treason in Ireland', Scollan said, "Many more of us through God's grace shall live to see the Union Jack of England down in the dust and our own immortal green interwoven with orange and white of the Irish republic waving proudly and victoriously over the land."

In 1915, Tom MacDonough asked the Hibernian Rifles to participate in the O'Donovan Rossa funeral, which they did, 150 strong, carrying rifles, the American flag and their own banner. They led the AA divisions and Ladies Auxiliary and dipped the American flag at the funeral (American flag no-dip protocol had not yet been established). They went on to participate in the Easter Rising and the four-page newsletter printed on Tuesday lists the Hibernian Rifles as part of the 'Dublin Division of the Army of the Republic'. They fought in the GPO and at the Exchange Hotel where member Ed Walsh was killed. They surrendered with the GPO garrison. Scollan was held at Richmond barracks before being transported to England's Wandsworth prison. In July, he was transferred to Frongoch Internment camp in Wales where other Hibernian Riflemen had been interned. Scollan was appointed camp treasurer until he was transferred to Reading jail in October. His position was filled by Michael Collins. Scollan and the Hibernian Riflemen were released under the general amnesty at Christmas 1916. J.J. Walsh was less fortunate, being singled out for Court Martial and sentenced to 10 years penal servitude because of his previous role in the Irish Volunteers. Walsh was released with the remaining prisoners on June 1917. The remaining Hibernian Rifles, along with the remaining Irish Volunteers, Citizen Army and Cumann na mBan coalesced into the military wing of the resurgent Sinn Fein political party and the original Irish Republican Army was

On Feb 9, I received an e-mail from Jackie Edgar in Seattle seeking information on her Grandfather whose name was J.J. Scollan! Excited, I immediately contacted her and she was kind enough to send me a photo of Brother Scollan's medal. She is looking for more of his memorabilia and will be traveling to Ireland for the Centennial where I hope to meet her. Coincidentally, an e-mail from AOH Historian Denis McCarthy of the County Cork Association, seeking information on a banner that he had found on the Internet, opened another door. The banner belonged to the Case family in Dublin and Richard Case said that in 1916, a soldier showed up at his grandparents' house and asked them to hold some bullets and a banner and he would return for them later. He never returned, and the family still had the banner, which they offered to the military museum at Collins Barracks. They couldn't identify its origin and brother McCarthy sought help via e-mails. The mystery was finally solved by John Ridge, President of the NY Historical Society, who identified it as a banner of the Hibernian Rifles of the American Alliance, noting that the number of shamrocks and laurel leaves total 48, which was the number of United States in 1912. With the help of these concerned historians, the Hibernian Rifles of the American Alliance need no longer be just a footnote in the story of the Easter Rising.
